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## **1. Farm Day May 5, 2011 - Third Grade Teachers Register Today!**

Third grade students from around El Dorado County can attend Farm Day on Thursday, May 5, 2011 at the El Dorado County Fairgrounds. Sponsored by El Dorado County Agriculture in the Classroom, this action packed day includes a variety of hands-on learning stations for students, from milking a cow to making compost for the garden. Registration is on a first come, first served basis and is set to close February 4<sup>th</sup>, but space is still available so register as soon as you can. Confirmation will be sent to teachers in mid-February.

## **2. Teacher's Summer Ag Institute, June 20-23, 2011**

Available to K-12 Teachers from Amador, Placer and El Dorado Counties  
Hosted by Ag in the Classroom – El Dorado County

The Teacher's Ag Summer Institute (TASI) links teachers with farmers, ranchers and other agricultural and natural resource specialists to gain a deeper understanding of the food and fiber production systems that sustain the health of people, society, and the environment. Teachers will explore real-world issues and acquire practical, easily transferable, standards-based instructional activities and resources to use daily in the classroom.

The TASI is FREE to local teachers --- only a \$25 registration fee is required at the time of acceptance into the program! Lodging and meals on the banks of the South Fork of the American River in Coloma, CA are included plus all resource materials. Teachers will receive a \$300 stipend upon attending the TASI and completing a lesson plan or class activity and presenting to the group at the "Back to the Farm" gathering on Thursday, July 14, 2011. ### **3. Funding Opportunity - Herb Gardens for Schools**

El Dorado County public schools now have an additional financial resource to help with their school gardens. The Gold Country Herb Society is pleased to announce the availability of V. Feagans Funds to help with the planning and maintenance of the herbal portion of the gardens.

Allocations in amounts not to exceed \$100.00 will be made and can be used for books, tools, speakers and field trips, plants, soil and amendments, and hardscape materials, all with an emphasis on herbs.

To be awarded the money simply write a letter to the Herb Society on your school stationery briefly describing your herb garden project with an itemization of your planned expenditures. Send the letter to Gold Country Herb Society, 3136 Gateway Drive, Cameron Park, CA. 95682. Each application will be reviewed by the Herb Society and awards will be made based on the relevancy of the application to herbs.
