Happy Holidays,

As we reflect on the past year, we have a lot to be thankful for. We've been extremely fortunate to have hired some amazingly talented new staff this year. Over the next few months we will highlight each of them so you can get better acquainted. We have also been working hard to expand a number of new programs throughout the region. Our partnership with FoodCorp continues to grow and flourish. This year we have two service members in Calaveras County. Lucas Hill and Kim Oldham will be building upon the previous years' programs and continue to expand garden based nutrition education and local procurement of fruits and vegetables in school cafeterias.

We also have been extremely excited to bring forth a brand new program to the region. The California Naturalist program is designed to introduce Californians to the wonders of our unique ecology and engage the public in study and stewardship of California's natural communities. We have offered three training programs throughout the region and have trained over 50 participants. Our 4-H youth development program is thriving. Our volunteers and staff continue to enrich the program with exciting curriculum, engaging activities, and overall making the program a place for youth to have fun and learn. Some new projects throughout the region include; GIS/GPS, robotics, rocketry, shooting sports, veterinary science, and viticulture. In addition there are dozens of animal related projects, cooking, cake decorating, sewing, and much more.

## New Garden and Nutrition Education Programs



Simply offering healthy options is not enough to motivate children to make healthy choices. Moreover, imposing restrictions rather than providing children with options to make healthy choices has long-term negative implications. With recent estimates of childhood obesity showing that approximately 32 percent of children are overweight or obese, it is clear a program that addresses multiple, obesity-related factors is necessary to successfully target this complex issue.

Central Sierra UCCE will be implementing the Shaping Healthy Choices Program (SHCP) which is a multi-component, school-based intervention composed of five components: 1) nutrition education and promotion, 2) family and community partnerships, 3) integration of regional agriculture, 4) foods available on the school campus, and 5) school wellness policies.

70,000 acres across Calaveras and a portion of Amador County. Thousands of people were evacuated as the fire raged through the Mokelumne river watershed towards Mountain Ranch. In all, the fire burned 475 residences and 343 outbuildings. In October, we hosted a recovering from wildfire workshop to provide the community with the most recent science on post fire recovery. Scientists and experts throughout the state discussed post fire management issues, treatment options, rehabilitation, regulations, oak regeneration, reforestation and much more. **Chris Kerston**

Chris Kerston has been grazing cattle for over a decade. With a longstanding passion for alternative agricultural models, Chris has dedicated much of his life to helping contact ranchers with common issues that create real value for both parties.

For 6 years, Chris co-managed a 2,000 acre diversified farm based on holistic grazing and permeability in the Sacramento Valley. The farm is comprised of old growth olive orchards, heirloom stonefruits and citrus groves, and also raises grass-fed cattle, sheep, goats, and pasture-raised chickens for both meat and eggs. Through creative positioning, the farm quickly attracted national notoriety and the attention from public figures such as Joel Salatin and Michael Pollan.

Chris has become a recognized public speaker championing for stronger connections between grower and eater and providing training to help build those connections. He has been on the forefront of the collaborative process with state and federal regulators, advocating for the recognition of alternative agricultural models as well as the consumer's right to access healthy local foods. Chris is also very enthusiastic about developing opportunities for young ranchers. Fostering creative solutions to removing barriers of available land and capital will ultimately help cultivate the next generation of holistic land stewards.
