Students will be joining the Master Gardeners at the June 9th Sale with handcrafted student Garden Art offered for a donation to their Gardening Program. The September Sale will be held at the School with tours of their Growing Domes and Native Gardens.

Master Gardeners will be on hand to answer your questions about gardening at Tahoe.

Whether it be growing vegetables, learning which plants attract butterflies and bees, finding out how to keep a garden growing with less water, or learning about various phenology studies that are taking place in our area, you will find a wealth of information.

UCCE Master Gardeners of Lake Tahoe are a dedicated group of locals, trained by University of California Cooperative Extension, sharing their knowledge to meet the horticulture needs of Lake Tahoe Basin gardeners. The Plant Sale supports their programs which include workshops, classes and other events such as Growing Food in Tahoe and the Tahoe Friendly Garden Program.

Broken tree branches getting you down?



What did the melting snow reveal about your landscape?

This year, the snowplows pushed my snowbanks higher and higher--until only the tippy top of my crabapple tree stuck above the snow.

This is how my tree looked once the snow melted away. Do you have broken and split branches? Bent or topped trees?

That exposed inner wood is an invitation for disease and pests to invade your trees and shrubs, so it's not too soon to get out your saw and clippers and do the pruning that will begin the healing process. But you may be like me--unsure where to start? What to save and what to remove?



This terrific reference, [After the Storm: Caring for your trees](#) by Montana State University Extension Forestry Specialist Peter Kolb, will show you how to treat various types of injuries. Simply scan the article until you see the illustration that matches your problem and you will feel confident and ready to get started.
