### *Meaning and Symbolism of Flowers & Plants at the Tallac Estates*

For centuries or even millennia, poets, priests, and royalty have ascribed meaning and symbolism to certain plants and flowers. For the priests (and many early scholars) the idea that the gods, or God would show the use or value of a plant based on some physical trait (the shape, color, location grown) known as a sign or signal. This system of plant values evolved to become known as Doctrine of Signatures, which had a hiccup in its acceptance of validity when plants from the new world and exotic locations came to Europe along with description of uses from their native lands. ## Quaking Aspen - *Populus tremuloides*


One of the most recognizable native deciduous trees in the Tahoe Basin, the Quaking Aspen is often found incorporated into the landscapes of residential and commercial lots. The fluttering foliage, which often turns a yellow gold coloration after the first frost and the tree's white bark make it one of the most photographed trees in Tahoe. The tree was a frequent recommendation for landscaping due to its fast growing characteristic, medium height, its tolerance to long winters and deep snow and its higher moisture content that help suppress fire movement through an aspen stand. Oregon Grape - This native shrub, sometimes called holly grape, is a tough plant that can truly survive with little to no care after it is established. The back yard was loaded with Oregon Grape that received no attention and virtually no water most of the summer except for the occasional shower.
