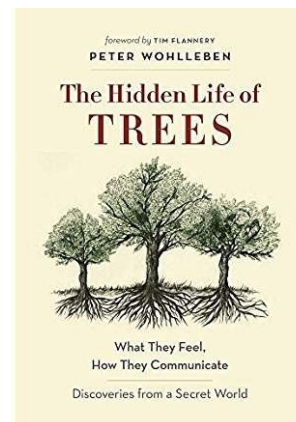
Some Books for the Garden Nerd and *Not So Nerdy Gardener*

Let's Talk Herbs

Herbs need at least 6 hours of sunlight per day just as your vegetables do. Sometimes it will work just fine to plant the herbs in your vegetable garden. Even better for Tahoe gardeners is to put them in pots among your vegetables. Thus the edible garden is complete.

You may want to fertilize herbs once or twice per season with a low nitrogen, organic fertilizer. Herbs need pruning, or rather cutting for use, to help them grow efficiently and maintain a pleasing shape.

Only a few herbs will be perennial in our Tahoe climate so you will be removing them at the end of the season to grow indoors or just discard as compost.

Question & Answer: **Early Bulb Emergence?**



Question: *I am worried about my bulb plants as they are already coming up now in February since we have had such warm weather and no snow. Will they be ruined for this year?*

Answer: Your bulb plant is designed by Mother Nature to withstand great fluctuations in sunlight and temperature early in the season. There may be growth above ground but the main source of energy for the plant is still underground and well protected. These leaves may develop and even turn yellow but the flower shoot will most likely be waiting until at

least 6 weeks of warmer weather before it begins to arise. The leaves that appear too soon and wither most likely will be replaced by new leaves at a later time. If you are concerned, you can try a little covering of mulch, pine needles and bark. Even if some flower buds appear and then are killed, you will still most likely have a later burst of flowers at the right time. Make sure to plant as late in the fall as possible for most bulbs so that they won't be attempting to grow until our late spring has arrived. They also must be planted at their proper depth to insure against premature growth.
