Greetings from UCCE Central Sierra,

There's a big change happening at the UCCE office in the Tuolumne County. After decades in our current building at 52 North Washington St. in Sonora we are moving to a new building. While this move is bitter sweet, I'd like to think of it as mostly sweet. Our long history in this building has been good to us, but we have outgrown it. Before COVID and working from home, we had three staff in one office! And, we are hoping to add another person soon. Our current space literally has no room for anyone new. I have been working with County Administrators for over a year now to come up with a viable solution.

Over the next few months, we will be packing up and moving to the 3rd floor of the A.N. Francisco Building at 48 Yaney Avenue. This building is just one block up from our current building on Washington Street so it's still easily accessible and downtown which was important to us. In fact, you may already use the parking spaces in the building's lower garage or the 20 minute parking space on Green Street! Our new office will have space for each staff to have their own office, plus will have a shared library/reading room, and conference room! An extra bonus is that this building is slated to have a generator installed which means we'll be able to keep working when the power goes out! There is some construction that needs to happen before we can move in and we hope that starts soon. I'll update you with a more detailed timeline as I learn more.

As a way to welcome us into our new building I'd like to have our volunteers, youth, families, and clientele help us decorate it. Introduction to Groundwater, Watersheds, and Groundwater Sustainability Plans - An Online Short Course

Understanding groundwater and watersheds and how we monitor, assess, and sustainably manage these resources is critical and integral to California Groundwater

Sustainability Plans (GSPs) and other water management programs. Private citizens, professionals, decision makers, executives, agency employees, and stakeholders with diverse backgrounds and in a wide variety of private, non-profit, and government responsibilities are increasingly engaged in the sustainable management and assessment of groundwater and surface water. This online short course will review the fundamental principles of groundwater and watershed hydrology, water budgets, water quality, and water law and regulation in an intuitive, highly accessible fashion. Through real world examples, participants learn about the most common tools for measuring, monitoring, and assessing groundwater and surface water resources. We then review the key steps and elements of planning for groundwater sustainability.

Forest Stewardship Workshop

Join the workshop to understand and protect your forests by developing a Forest Management Plan. Topics include:

- Forest management objectives and planning
- Forest health, insects and disease
- Forest and fire ecology, wildlife, watersheds
- Fuels reduction and forest resource marketing
- Mapping, inventory and silviculture
- Project development & permitting
- Getting professional help and cost-share opportunities

Living with Wildfire

Forest Health and Fire Preparedness

Ready to start preparing your land for fire season? Not sure where to start?

At this event, we will join Lenya Quinn-Davidson, UC Cooperative Extension Fire Advisor, for a lesson on fire ecology in Northern California and why our forests require human intervention. Mary Mayeda, the Forest Program manager at the Mendocino County Resource Conservation District, will tell us about the many practices we can carry out as land stewards and volunteers to make our forests healthier and more resilient to fire, as well as what resources are available to help make land management happen. Last but not least, we'll go through the steps of preparing and executing a prescribed burn with Mike Jones, UC Cooperative Extension Forestry Advisor. Come prepared with your notebook because we'll be pointing you all in the right direction towards outside resources for you to learn more about topics that interest you after the event.

This is the second event in a multi-part series which will more deeply explore specific effects of climate change.

Why Can?

This past year lots of people explored preserving food by canning for the first time. It's a great way to create a stock of shelf-stable food, and is a fun family activity.

When we preserve food, we have one food safety goal: to keep pathogens from growing in our foods and spoiling it. To do this, we either destroy those pathogens or prevent them from growing.

Canning uses heat to destroy molds, bacteria, and yeasts so they can't grow. The vacuum seal protects the jar's contents so outside contaminants stay outside. This creates a shelf-stable product.

The National Center for Home Food Preservation recommends using the following methods to can high acid foods such as jams, jellies, fruits and pickles: boiling water canning and atmospheric steam canning. Use pressure canning to preserve low acid foods such as vegetables, soups, broths, meats and fish. For details on the processes, visit <https://nchfp.uga.edu>.

If you do a general internet search for canning jams and jellies and other popular products, you find people using open kettle canning, oven canning, and sealing jars with paraffin wax. These methods don't ensure that all pathogens in the product are destroyed. Let's take a look at each of those methods to make sure you understand what they are.

GREEN BLOG ARTICLE No need to amend soil when planting new trees or perennials

Gardeners who follow conventional wisdom and nursery recommendations to mix organic amendments into the soil when planting new trees or perennials in their landscapes are making a mistake, according to UC Cooperative Extension environmental horticulture experts.

“This is one of the garden myths that I'm trying to dispel,” said Jim Downer, UCCE environmental horticulture advisor in Ventura County. “We recommend residents not amend the soil when they are planting based on outcomes we have observed in research.”

Downer and Ben Faber, UCCE advisor for water, soils and subtropical crops in Ventura County, summarized this and other information about the use of organic amendments in home landscapes in a six-page publication now available for free download from the UC Agriculture and Natural Resources catalog

Harvest of the Month



Onions are one of the most common vegetables in the world. Readily available year-round, onions are often the supporting flavor in a dish, not usually the main event. In Spring, however, when the first fresh onions of the year begin appearing in gardens and local markets, we have the opportunity to appreciate onions as the juicy, naturally sweet and savory vegetables they are. While there are a few different types of onions commonly sold in stores, in fact there are many different varieties that all have subtly different flavors. “Green” onions, also known as scallions or Spring onions, are young onion plants harvested with their green tops. Green onions and other types of fresh onions that are sold with their tops still attached should be eaten quickly and stored in the refrigerator. Onions with no tops and paper-like skins have been cured, or dried once mature, so that they can be stored for longer periods of time. This kind of onion should be kept in a cool, dry place with good air flow, such as in a paper bag in a pantry. Refrigerators are too moist to store cured onions for long, as the wet environment can cause them to sprout. However, once a cured onion is cut any remaining pieces should be stored in the refrigerator if the whole onion is not used immediately. Nutritionally, onions are a good source of Vitamin C, and also contain fiber, Vitamin B6, and potassium. See below for
